New Multi-Year Strategic Plan and Brand

The Huron-Superior Catholic District School Board is delighted to begin 2021 by launching both its new Multi-Year Strategic Plan (MYSP) and its new brand. The new brand reflects the board's commitment to the success and well-being of our students, development and knowledge of our Catholic faith, responsible and equitable stewardship of our resources, and ongoing engagement with our stakeholders. These same priorities are also highlighted in the board's new MYSP.

One thing you might immediately notice is the shift in our logo's colours. As an acknowledgement of our board's rich history and tradition, we purposely maintained blue as our predominant colour. This "board blue" is reflected both in the logo and in the lettering below it. However, the colours and design of the new logo also reflect the present and future. The board's use of white, black, yellow, and red – the colours of the medicine wheel – intentionally honours the important place that Indigenous students, families, communities, traditions, perspectives, and education have in our board. The splash of green in our logo reflects our board's focus on practices and decisions that build a sustainable future.



Equity & Inclusion

We continue to provide rich professional development to employees, students and community members to help ensure respectful, positive, safe, equitable, and inclusive learning and working environments, free from discrimination and harassment.

School and Classroom Practices

Our Multi-Year Strategic Plan focuses in part on Supportive Environments and Well-Being. Through this strategic direction, we strive to strengthen partnerships with Indigenous community members and parents. We also work hard to increase the knowledge and understanding of all staff and students with regards to Indigenous perspectives, histories, current realities, and ways of knowing.

In 2019-20, an Indigenous Grad Coach supported our Indigenous students, by focusing on improving attendance, credit accumulation, and graduation rates. The Grad Coach worked out of the culture room at St. Mary's College, which was refreshed with new furniture and resources to better meet the needs of the students. Cultural spaces were also created in both Elliot Lake schools and in Chapleau, so that students could see their cultures are valued.

Additional Native-as-a-Second-Language opportunities were funded by the board in two schools in Elliot Lake and in the span of one year, grew into a robust program providing Indigenous language and cultural instruction to over 65 students in each school.

The board prayer was translated into French and Ojibwe. The Virtues of the Month included English, French, and Ojibwe Grandfather teachings. The Elders in the Classroom program continued in every school in our board. Through this program, students have the opportunity to interact with local Elders through the use of language, stories and cultural activities.

Data on student achievement are collected, analyzed and used to identify gaps in achievement, develop strategies to close those gaps, and improve overall student achievement. The Early Interventions Special Assignment Teacher position was created to assist with transitioning students into school and supporting reading and math skills in the primary grades.

Our students with special needs were supported in achieving the goals outlined in their Individual Education Plans (IEPs). Through the use of our tiered system of support, students were equitably supported by our learning resource teachers, educational assistants, and Special Education Department staff. Similarly, students' mental health was supported through our student and family counsellors and Mental Health Leader.

All schools' Code of Conduct addresses discrimination; the code is reviewed yearly and communicated to the school community. Complaints about incidents of discrimination, bullying and harassment are dealt with in a serious, fair, and timely manner.

Leadership, Governance, and Human Resources

The board believes that Equity and Inclusive Education (EIE) applies to all aspects of its school operations. System and school leaders work collaboratively to ensure that our policies, procedures and practices promote an environment that respects diversity and is free from discrimination. The board continues to develop partnerships in our communities and engage all of its stakeholders.

The board continues its work towards improving accessibility for all, in terms of access to information and our buildings. Our board's website is now fully accessible, and our Human Resources Department ensures that all job applicants are aware of their rights to access information in a format that meets their needs. In 2020, physical accessibility upgrades were completed at St. Francis French Immersion in Sault Ste. Marie and St. Mary's in Blind River.

EIE professional development opportunities are offered to teachers, principals, and supervisory officers through mentoring programs (e.g., NTIP). EIE leadership opportunities for students have been created and / or have continued. These include, but are not limited to, Indigenous Student Council, Junior and Senior Student Senate, and NET Retreat.

Data Collection, Integration, and Reporting

Our board continues to focus on providing inclusive curriculum and assessment procedures to ensure that all students are able to reach their full potential. Educators use culturally responsive teaching and inclusive curriculum materials in their learning activities so that all students have the opportunity to learn about authentic histories and cultures and see themselves positively reflected in the learning environment. Data on student achievement are collected, analyzed and used in school improvement planning to identify achievement gaps and develop strategies to close those gaps.

At both the board and school levels, identity-based student data are compared with data on achievement, attendance, graduation, credit accumulation, violent incidents, suspensions, and expulsions. This comparative data informs the board's decision-making about programming and resource allocation, so that barriers to student success are addressed and students who are disadvantaged and marginalized are supported.

EIE principles continue to be embedded into the board's cyclical policy and procedural guideline review process. This year, Policy 7010 – Equity and Inclusive Education and its associated procedural guidelines were reviewed and approved by the Board of Trustees, affirming our commitment to continuing the work to support and embrace diversity within our Catholic community.

To support an aligned and integrated approach to implementation, EIE principles are embedded in areas such as student achievement, curriculum and assessment, safe schools, healthy schools, special education, mental health, leadership development, hiring practices, Indigenous education, and French-language education initiatives.

Pathways Planning & Supports

The Huron-Superior Catholic District School Board is committed and called to promoting student pathways planning and supports for all students.

Planning for future education careers is based around the fundamental questions:

- → Who am I?,
- → What are my opportunities?,
- → Who do I want to become?, and
- → What is my plan for achieving my goals?

During the 2019-20 school year, every Grade 7 and 8 student participated in a range of activities that broadened their knowledge and understanding of the different career pathway opportunities available to them.

The Grade 8 students were involved in the Challenge Method. This multi-day exercise focused on identifying challenges, problems, or issues that students would be interested in solving. The challenges then offered a variety of career paths for our students.

The Challenge Method is a novel idea that frees student's traditional methods and allows them to find a career path based on real-world challenges, not job titles.

The Grade 8 female students from four of our elementary schools, took part in the "Tenaris Open Doors Tour" which included a tour of both Algoma Steel and Tenaris Tubes. The goal of these tours was to inspire and promote female interest in the career pathway of the manufacturing industry.





Messages From Our Partners

The Principals and Vice-Principals of the Huron-Superior Catholic District School Board work collaboratively with our Senior Administration team to serve our collective staffs, families, and students. As members of the Catholic Principals Council of Ontario (CPCO), our school administrators are also active in their respective communities, leading social justice projects and serving on any number of committees, all for the betterment of our local populations.

We currently find ourselves in stressful times associated with everything 'COVID,' and as such, we will continue to monitor the wellbeing of all of our students, adopting the best strategies available to focus on student, staff and family wellness.
